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General information about the university

University of Jyväskylä	<p>University of Jyväskylä (JYU) is an internationally ranked research university. We are one of the largest and most popular multidisciplinary universities in Finland. JYU provides a genuinely supportive and enjoyable environment for studying. Our university has 14 300 students from about 100 countries. We believe that interaction with people from different cultures and backgrounds is an essential part of academic studies and the university experience. We are therefore committed to promoting international cooperation. JYU offers undergraduate and postgraduate degrees, teacher training programmes and over 100 disciplines within the Faculties of Education and Psychology, Humanities and Social Sciences, Information Technology, Mathematics and Science, Sport and Health Sciences, and the School of Business and Economics.</p> <p>Study experience at JYU is shown as excellent results in the International Student Barometer (ISB) in autumn 2017: Over 90% of our international respondents are satisfied with their study experience. In the survey, JYU's ratings for satisfaction with living were the best worldwide and satisfaction with teaching was the highest in Finland. The city of Jyväskylä and the campus	<p>“A small city with a big feel” accurately describes Jyväskylä, located in the lake district of Finland some 270 kilometres north of Helsinki. It has the advantages of a small town being comfortable, compact and safe, and at the same time, it is a bustling modern centre of industry and learning. Out of the 142 000 inhabitants in the Jyväskylä region almost one fourth are students.</p> <p>The naturally beautiful JYU campus is a combination of modern style and classics of the famous architect Alvar Aalto. Seminaarinmäki campus was awarded 2022 with European Heritage Label. Estimated cost of living	<p>International students must be able to pay for their food, accommodation, transport, social life, etc. The average living expenses of a single student in Jyväskylä amounts to about €800-900 per month. Average monthly costs:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • rent in a student apartment 280 - 420 € • food 250-300 € (eg. a lunch in a student restaurant 2,95 € for Bachelor’s and Master’s level students) • transport, leisure and other costs 150-250 €

Nominations	<p>Nominations should be sent via our online nomination form. The link will be sent to partner universities when a new application period begins.</p> <p>Nomination deadlines:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Autumn semester: 1 May • Spring semester: 15 October
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	Please note that only 50% of the nominated students can be students aiming to study Education at JYU.
Application periods	Autumn semester: 15 March - 15 May Spring semester: 1 September - 1 November <i>Please notice that it is highly recommended that students coming from countries outside the EU apply well in advance because the application process for the residence permit to Finland will take more than a month (especially for the autumn semester).</i>
Application form	In order to be admitted to the University of Jyväskylä, students must fill in an online application through the Mobility-Online system. The link to the online application will be send to the nominated students. The application instructions can be found at https://www.jyu.fi/en/study-with-us/student-exchange-at-jyu . In addition, students should attach an official transcript of records (in English) and a copy of their passport to the online application. Students also need to submit their preliminary study plan (Learning Agreement) as part of the online application. Course registration is done after the student's arrival to Jyväskylä and it is then possible to make changes to the preliminary study plan. Paper copies of the application or its attachments are not required.

Which courses to choose?	Exchange students can choose courses from the curriculum of their host department and/or from the international study programmes arranged at the University of Jyväskylä. Some courses may be open to all exchange students. The openness is indicated in the course description by 'ALL' or a similar marking. Restrictions: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Some courses may be targeted at students of a particular department or faculty only. - Courses may have prerequisites which participants must fulfil.
Course levels	The fourth character in the course code indicates the level of study as follows: P = Basic studies, bachelor level A = Intermediate studies, bachelor level S = Advanced studies, master level.
Language of instruction	All courses offered for exchange students are given in English, apart from some language courses.

Accommodation	
How to apply for student housing	International students are accommodated in the housing units of Central Finland Student Housing Foundation (KOAS) and Soihtu Housing. Accommodation is located about 2,5 - 4 kilometres from the main campus. Students can apply for housing via a separate form during the following application periods: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Autumn semester: 7 May - 20 May • Spring semester: 18 October - 1 November Priority is given to students coming from FORTHEM partner universities and students coming through the following exchange programmes, provided they apply on time: Bilateral, Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility, ISEP.

Further information	The apartments are usually shared by two (sometimes more) students. Each student will have a study-bedroom for him/herself. The kitchen and bathroom are shared with a roommate. Tenancy period	JYU has reserved a quota of furnished study-bedrooms for exchange students. Those placed in the study-bedrooms of KOAS or Soihtu within the quota are required to sign a tenancy agreement for a fixed term. The fixed-term tenancy agreement cannot be terminated within the tenancy period.
Availability of the apartments	Student housing cannot be guaranteed to all applicants during the autumn semester. Most students coming for the spring semester will be able to get a room from KOAS or Soihtu. Student apartments are available from the first working day of the month. If students arrive earlier, they may have to stay at a hotel or hostel until the student apartment is available. Monthly rent and deposit	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The price for a furnished single study-bedroom with a shared kitchen and bathroom varies from 280 € to 360 € per month. A limited number of studios are also available at Soihtu. The price for a studio apartment is about 400 € per month. A deposit and/or rent for the first month must be paid to the accommodation office's bank account in order to confirm the housing offer. • A furniture fee of about 15-25 €/month is added to the rent (furniture includes a bed, desk, chair, storage space). • Internet connection, basic household items and bedding (mattress, pillow and duvet, but no towels or bed linen) are also included in the rent of a furnished apartment. Laundry facilities, saunas and common rooms are available in the buildings.

Language Courses and Language Skills Required

Language skills required	Applicants should be at least B1 but preferably B2 (or higher) level users of the English language. Students should be able to follow university lectures in English, participate in seminar discussions and understand written material in their field. In addition, most courses require writing essays and research papers.
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	<p>A language test certificate is not required from exchange students.</p> <p>NB! In order to apply for English as a major subject during the exchange, a student needs to have at least a level B2 of English proficiency. Exchange students are accepted to study English as their major on a case-by-case basis.</p>
Finnish and Academic English language courses offered in August	<p>The Centre for Multilingual Academic Communication - Movi organises beginner courses in Finnish and advanced courses in English: These courses are organized in August before the regular semester teaching begins. The courses are free of charge for exchange students.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Survival Finnish • Advanced Summer Course in English for students whose English language proficiency level is B2-C1 (upper intermediate – advanced). • Intensive Summer Course in Academic English for students whose English language proficiency level is A2-B1 (lower intermediate – intermediate). <p>Students must apply separately. Application deadline is 15 May. NB. Language courses offered during the semesters	<p>The Centre for Multilingual Academic Communication – Movi offers courses in Finnish, English and other languages, as well as in multilingualism and intercultural communication during the semesters. Residence Permit

EU/EEA/EFTA citizens

Citizens of the EU/EEA/EFTA countries do not need a residence permit but they must register their right to reside in Finland if their continuous stay in Finland lasts for longer than 90 days. The registration should be done by submitting an application for registration and visiting a service point of the Finnish

Non-EU/EEA/EFTA citizens	<p>Citizens of non-EU/EEA/EFTA countries who wish to stay in Finland for more than 90 days must be in possession of a residence permit when entering the country. An application for the permit should be submitted electronically at https://migri.fi/en/home as soon as the student has received the letter of admission. In addition to the electronic application, all applicants must visit a Finnish mission or a VFS Global application centre in their country of residence in person to prove their identity More information: https://migri.fi/en/guide-for-students.</p> <p>In order to obtain a residence permit to study in Finland, international students must show that their income is secured for their exchange period. They must be able to prove that they have at their disposal at least EUR 800 per study month. The following conditions must also be fulfilled:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the applicant must be at least 18 years of age • the application must provide evidence that the applicant has been accepted as a full-time student in Finland (letter of admission) • details of the comprehensive health insurance cover (with a reliable and solvent company or institution) must be attached to the application <p>Doctoral students must apply for a residence permit for scientific research https://migri.fi/en/researcher. NB! Doctoral students must be able to prove that they have at their disposal at least EUR 1090 per study month.</p> <p>NB! Please notice that if a student wishes to open a Finnish bank account, s/he needs to be in possession of a valid residence permit.</p>
Non-EU/EEA/EFTA citizens studying in an EU/EEA/EFTA country	Citizens of a non-EU/EEA/EFTA country who study in an EU/EEA/EFTA country as a degree student should have a valid residence permit in the country where they study as a degree student. In addition, a mobility notification should be submitted to the Finnish Immigration Service. More information: https://migri.fi/en/mobility-notification-to-finland

Insurance

All students studying at the University of Jyväskylä are responsible for obtaining their own insurance. Insurance cover

EU/EEA/EFTA citizens	Citizens of the EU/EEA/EFTA countries should bring a European Health Insurance Card with them. The European Health Insurance Card entitles the holder to all medically necessary care during his/her stay on the same terms as the local residents. Some health centre services are by law free of charge but the health centres may charge for certain services. Additional health and travel insurance is strongly recommended to cover any unexpected expenses, such as repatriation, medical transport or damage to personal belongings.

Student tutors and free-time activities

Student tutors/ Arrival Service	<p>The International Office employs tutors (senior students) from each faculty. Their task is to acquaint new international students with the system of studies and campus life in Jyväskylä and to help them with practical questions, such as planning a timetable for studies and finding their way around the campus and the city centre.</p> <p>Tutors will contact arriving students a couple of weeks before the beginning of the semester. For music and culture lovers the University offers many other free time activities, including performances by the University Symphony Orchestra, several choirs and bands, student theatre, and a rock club with stand-up comedy nights and improvisation theatre.</p> <p>The Student Union in cooperation with JYU's subject associations bring together students sharing the same study field and help in creating a community at the University. The associations organise various events for their members, create opportunities to influence and pursue shared interests.
