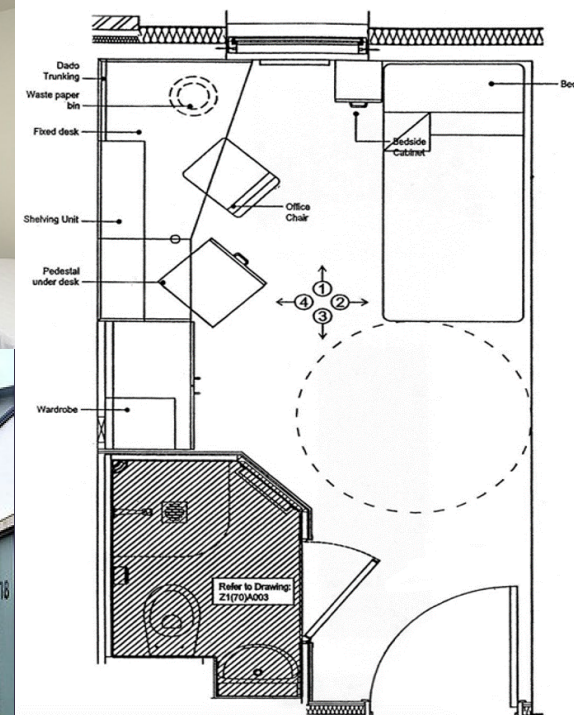

January Assessments and Semester 1 exchange students

Semester 1 students who wish to return to their home institution with UWE credit must ensure they are present for the January assessment period *if required*.

Many courses now offer electronic submissions, so it may not be necessary to sit an exam in Bristol – students are advised to check with their course leaders on arrival.

Exceptions are made for a small number of partners where the student's home University term *starts prior* to the end of UWE's examination period.

UWE does not offer the option for incoming students to sit exams required for their home university on campus at UWE. Incoming students will need to arrange an alternative form of assessment with their home university.

Nomination Deadlines

31st March for Semester 1 and full-year study commencing in September

30th September for Semester 2 commencing in January

Exchange Application Deadlines

1 May for Semester 1 and full year study commencing in September.

31 October for Semester 2 commencing in January.

Exchange Application Process

1. Nomination by home University to studyabroad@uwe.ac.uk
2. Link to online Admissions application form sent direct to student email address

Students intending to study in the [School of Arts](#) should send an electronic portfolio prior to arrival to ensure they are placed in the correct subject area.

Following application, official University communication with incoming students will be via the student **Welcome Website**. Students will be sent a login ID and a password via email once their application has been processed. All information about joining the University, Visa instructions, Airport transfers, Registration and the International Student Orientation will be provided here.

Visa Information

Terminology: If you require a Visa to enter the UK you are a 'Visa national'.

As an exchange student you will be coming to the UK to study a Higher Education course.

Visa nationals studying for **longer than 6 months**, or visa nationals who intend to combine study with work will require a [Student Visa](#).

Visa nationals studying for **less than 6 months** may require a [Standard Visitor Visa](#).

The Study Abroad & UWE Admissions teams will provide the appropriate documentation to support students in their visa application. If a student requires a visa to study in the UK it is the responsibility of the student to ensure compliance with the requirements of the visa that is issued.

It is essential that you get the correct Visa, if one is required, for your study in the UK.

Students who are nominated for Semester 1 **cannot** extend their exchange to full year after they have arrived in the UK. This is due to Visa regulations. Any extension requests must be made by the student prior to arrival and in sufficient time to be issued with a Student Visa for the start of the year.

Taught Language

Students are expected to arrive with a sufficient level of English in order to be able to follow classes and submit all assessments in English. We recommend a minimum of [B1 CEFR](#).

For exchange students, proof of English language is not normally required for entry to the programme – but may be required by the UK Government, if necessary, for Visa purposes.

UWE's [English Language and Academic Skills Unit](#) provide Study Support workshops, seminars and drop-in sessions to support students with their studies.

Airport Transfers

UWE offers a no-cost Airport Transfer Service for new students. This operates from London Heathrow International Airport at the start of each semester prior to the International Student Orientation programme. Up to date details will be published on our web pages here:

University Managed Accommodation

Students will be invited to apply for accommodation after completion of the exchange application. Please note that students cannot apply for accommodation prior to submitting an exchange application.

Applications for university managed accommodation opens on 13 June 2024. We recommend students make it a priority to apply for accommodation as soon as possible.

Accommodation contracts run alongside UWE's [term dates](#). This means that accommodation contract dates are **not flexible**; instead they follow the structure of our 3-term academic year, with most contracts running until the end of December for students attending UWE for Semester 1 only, and June or Mid-July for students attending UWE for full year or Semester 2.

[UWE accommodation](#) includes the cost of gas and electricity; [Contents insurance](#) for personal possessions (excludes bicycles); Internet Connection (with the exception of University houses) and costs between £4,1843.13 and £8,547.00 for a 40 -45 week contract.

Council Tax

Exchange students in *private* accommodation need to provide evidence of their student status to Bristol City Council to prove their [exemption from paying Council Tax](#).

Each student staying in private accommodation should complete the online form found on the Bristol City Council website to see if they are eligible for exemption.

Students staying in UWE accommodation will not be liable for Council Tax.

Student Support

The [Study Abroad team](#) work closely with students' home institutions and academic departments to ensure the smooth running of study exchanges and are happy to answer queries from incoming exchange students.

UWE's [Global Student Support](#) team coordinate the International Student Orientation. All exchange students are recommended to participate in orientation events and activities – designed to help students meet people, have fun and to get to know UWE, Bristol and each other! We recommend students to keep up to date with all that the Global Centre has to offer via [Instagram](#) .

The Orientation programme will be available [online](#) as soon as it is finalised.

Our [Student Support Advisers](#) can provide students with information on a wide range of University matters, including module choices, academic regulations and extenuating circumstances. Students can also discuss academic issues with their departmental exchange coordinators or with their module leaders.

Student advisors can give guidance on [managing money](#) as well as [Visas, Immigration and the UK's PBS](#) (Points based system).

Our [Wellbeing Service](#) provides support for students experiencing personal issues.

Our [Faith and Spirituality](#) service provides facilities and information for prayer, worship, meditation and reflection, opportunities to meet others and advice on spiritual and ethical concerns.

UWE's Students' Union (UWESU) has over 30,000 members and works to promote, defend and extend the rights of students, to initiate change and to enhance the student experience. [UWESU's advice centre](#) can help with money matters, employment, housing and other matters.

Access to health care and Health insurance

The University's [Health Centre](#) based on the Frenchay campus treats students for minor injuries and illnesses.

All non-UK students can register with a Doctor free of charge.

The UK's National Health Service (NHS) provides free hospital treatment, free access to doctors, fixed charges for medicines and fixed charges for dentistry and opticians. Most EU, UK and International students studying for longer than six months can register for a HC1 certificate which allows them to reclaim the costs of paid-for services.

Visa nationals studying in the UK on a course less than six months long will need to arrange their own health insurance.

To make an appointment to see a Doctor (known as a 'GP'), students must first register with a practice (a Doctor's surgery). Full information can be found here:

Costs

For exchange students from partner institutions studying for a full year, tuition is free for up to 120 UWE credits (60 ECTS).

For exchange students from partner institutions studying for a single semester, tuition is free for up to 60 UWE credits (30 ECTS).

Students are responsible for all personal expenses, including accommodation costs.

For a 9-month course, students should expect their living costs (including accommodation) to be approximately £7,200 – this will vary according to personal habits.

UWE accommodation costs between approx. £4,148.34 and £7,679.88 for a 40 - 45 week contract and includes most bills, whereas Private accommodation costs upwards of £3,500 a year, excluding bills.

Study Options

Please note that cross-department study is not permitted. You will only be able to study subject areas noted in the exchange agreement between institutions. This is due to multiple campuses and timetable clashes.

Please be aware that exchange students are usually allocated to study modules (courses) during level 2 (year2) of the Bachelor's programme, unless specifically agreed otherwise in advance of registering at UWE.

Certificates of Credit (Transcripts)

At the end of the academic year, students who have passed modules at UWE will receive an official Certificate of Credit (also known as a Transcript). We are only able to list modules that students have *passed* on the certificates. Any module a student has failed to pass will *not* be included.

Certificates are only produced after the UWE Award Boards have been completed. This is normally about 6 weeks after the end of the exam period.

We will send **electronic copies only**.
